Purpose

The Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame has been created to provide a medium whereby it is possible to honor participants for their outstanding achievements and contributions in the field of athletics.

Criteria for Nomination

- 1. All nominees (individuals) and teams must have outstanding achievements and contributions in the field of athletics from the Greater Flint Area.
- 2. Excellence far above the ordinary field of endeavor is required.
- Individuals should have a minimum of five years involvement with the sport or sports.
- 4. Professional athletes in a team sport shall not be eligible for election to the Greater Flint Hall of Fame unless they have retired from participation for at least three years.

Rules

- Any individual or team who meets the aforementioned criteria may be nominated.
- 2. Nominations must be made on an official Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame form which is available from the reception desk at the Genesys Athletic Club or from Bob Root, Athletic Director at Carman-Ainsworth High School. Once the form is completed in full, it must be returned to Mr. Root with all other available information regarding the individual or team included.
- No individual living inductee will be formally inducted without his/her approval.

Deadline for Nomination is April 1st each year

Beginning this October, 2011 the Board of Directors will honor former Board Members who have retired after serving the Hall of Fame meritoriously. Their extraordinary leadership in a variety of capacities has enabled the organization to successfully continue the mission of honoring participants for their outstanding achievements and contributions in the field of athletics.

As we conclude our 32nd year, it is more than appropriate that we begin to recognize these individual volunteers who have served in such an exceptional manner. Active participation and contributions in the activities and leadership of the organization that exceed what may be considered normal and traditional, will remain the primary standard of formal **EMERITUS** recognition.

Initially, five individuals will be selected and each year thereafter two may be chosen. These individuals will be formally recognized each year at the Press Party held in October. Their names will be permanently listed in the official souvenir banquet booklet and on the Hall of Fame web site.

EMERITUS recognition requires nomination by a current member of the Board of Directors and a 2/3 majority approval of the members present at a regularly scheduled meeting.

For the year 2011, the following retired former members have been selected for **MEMBER EMERITUS** recognition:

DICK DALY

Joined the GFASHOF Board of Directors in 1988 and served as Executive Secretary (1992-1997), Vice President (2000-2003) and President (2004). Retired in 2005 with 17 years of service. Currently remains active as the publisher of the GFASHOF annual induction banquet book. Formally inducted into the GFASHOF as a Special Service recipient in 2006.

JIM MASSAR

Member of the GFASHOF Board of Directors since 1982, retiring in 2010 with 28 years of service. He served as Vice President (1990-1991) and as President in 1992 and 1993. Among many significant contributions, Jim developed the GFASHOF Team Room located at Genesys. This room, dedicated to the accomplishments of teams inducted to the GFASHOF, was named the "Jim Massar Team Room" in 2011.

MAYOR JIM RUTHERFORD

A charter member of the GFASHOF Board of Directors serving 30 consecutive years from 1980 until retirement in 2010. He served as Vice President (1980-1983) and President (1984-1985). Mayor Jim later assumed responsibilities as Recording Secretary and Parliamentarian in 2004 until retirement. Honored posthumously.

CATHY SNYDER

A charter member of the GFASOF Board of Directors having served for 30 consecutive years until retirement in 2010. Cathy served as Vice President from 1984-1987 and as President from 1988-1989. She assumed many, varied responsibilities throughout her career and is regarded by colleagues as the "Ambassador" of the GFASHOF.

JUDGE TOM YEOTIS

Judge Tom was one of the founding fathers of the GFASHOF having initiated the idea as a member of the Genesee County Bruin Club (Mott College) in 1980. He guided the Board of Directors, serving as the first President in (1980-1981), during the initial stages of growth. Judge Tom remained active for 18 years retiring in 1998. Formally inducted to the GFASHOF as a Special Service recipient in 2007.









DAVE LAZAR - COACHING GREAT

Lisa (Hillman) Taylor wasn't about to let a headache keep her off the softball field.

But keeping her aliment from Fenton coach Dave Lazar wasn't going to be easy. Not with her sister, Nikki Hillman, urging her to let Lazar in on her secret.

The Hillman sisters formed one of the top batteries in the state during the spring of 1993, with Lisa on the mound and Nikki behind the plate.

During a weekend tournament game in Canton, they couldn't agree on whether Lisa should stay in the contest.

Lazar, sensing something was wrong, had both girls take a break on the bench.

"He was like 'If you're going to fight, you're going to sit down," Taylor said. "He knew how to handle his players. It was exactly what we needed."

When the Hillmans returned to the diamond, Fenton not only went on to win the tournament, but the Tigers ended up posting a school-record 43-2 mark and reached the Class B state finals.

Lazar's understanding, of not only the strategy, but the psychology of the game, enabled him to develop one of the top softball programs in the state.

He posted a Flint-area record 725-262 (.735) overall mark and won three state championships during his 28 seasons at Fenton, a resume that has earned him enshrinement into the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame.

"Nothing is guaranteed as far as winning goes," Lazar said. "There are a lot of factors that go into it. I always seemed to have good kids who dedicated their time."

Lazar took over Fenton's program in 1976 and it didn't take long for a legend to be born. Two years later, the Tigers won their first of three straight Class B state championships.

Fenton posted an 81-11 (.880) overall record — 39-1 in the Metro League — from 1978-80. Since the state tournaments began in 1975, the Tigers are one of only four programs — two public school teams — to snare three or more consecutive titles.

Kalamazoo Christian captured a state-record five straight championships from 1996-2000, Harper Woods Regina won four in a row from 2004-07 and Portage Northern won three consecutive crowns from 2000-02.

"It was a great group of athletes and we had a leader that knew how put everybody's talent in the right spot," said Kim (Covert) Lewis, who was a two-year starter for Fenton from 1979-80. "He knew how to get the best out of us. We tried not to let him down because he never let us down."

Throughout his tenure at Fenton, Lazar's teams were a staple of stability, winning 20 or more games 24 times and 30 or more four times.

The Tigers routinely went on long postseason runs, capturing 13 district titles and six regional crowns. Fenton reached the Class B state championship game in 1993, losing 1-0 in 20 innings to Pinconning.

The Tigers became the flagship program in the Metro,



winning a league-record 17 titles during his tenure. Under the Flint native's tutelage, the Tigers had only one losing season overall.

"He's the best of the best," said Becki (Wheatley) Moore, who was a four-year varsity performer for Fenton from 1993-96, earning first-team All-State honors at shortstop her last two seasons. "His attention to detail and to doing things the right way, and I don't just mean softball, set a great life example for the players he coached."

Lazar's coaching talents were not just restricted to softball. The 1957 Flint Central graduate coached in the Tigers' football program for 27 years.

He was the freshman coach for five years and the junior varsity coach for 15 years. He coached at the varsity level for seven seasons, including two years (1998-99) as the head coach.

His 1998 squad posted a 7-2 overall record and won a share of the Metro championship, the program's first since 1989. His 1999 team went 5-4 and earned the program's first state playoff berth since 1993.

"He had that combination of intensity, knowledge and experience," said former Fenton athletic director Ken Wensel, who hired Lazar. "Athletes responded to him. You add that up, you have a guy that was ready to accomplish some great things."

Lazar taught at Fenton High School from 1973-74 to 1999-2000. He retired from coaching at the end of the 2003 season.

He was inducted into the Michigan High School Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1996 and the Fenton Hall of Fame in 2010.

He said he gives a lot of credit for his success to his former co-coach Barry Bailey.

"My church and my family gave me a structure and foundation in my life," Lazar said. "You can't always do it by yourself. I was lucky to be in the right place at the right time."



CHERYL HISTED - ALL SPORTS STAR

Cheryl Histed's youth was spent honing her athletic skills in informal ways.

Histed, who earned 16 varsity letters in volleyball, basketball and softball at Kearsley High School, sharpened her competitive edge through less-than-organized competitions against some of her five siblings and many neighbors.

"There must have been about 50 kids in our neighborhood near Holy Rosary School who were within two years of my age," Histed recalled. "We used the athletic fields there as our playground. Sometimes, we'd play basketball outside in the winter and I would keep one ball in a bucket in hot water. When the one we were using froze, I would run inside the house, down the stairs to get the warm ball and keep playing."

That kind of training served Histed well as she went on to become one of the most decorated female prep athletes in Big Nine Conference history.

She was a four-year starter and some type of all-conference all four years in volleyball, basketball and softball before graduating in 1981 and moving on to a record-setting volleyball career at Michigan State University.

Histed, a Davison High School physical education teacher, is part of the Greater Flint Sports Hall of Fame's 2011 Class. She will be inducted Dec. 3 at Genesys Conference and Banquet Center.

"Getting into the Hall of Fame



surprised me," Histed said. "With the number of outstanding coaches and athletes from Flint, I am just proud to be among them. I never thought about getting into the Hall of Fame. I played sports because I loved it and was not looking for accolades."

Indeed. Fueling her competitive nature was enough for Histed. Another way she did that as a youth was by playing basketball against neighborhood brothers Mike and Mark Torok.

"They challenged me and taught me to take a challenge," Histed said. "I learned that if I was ever going to beat or compete with the guys, I had to get better. We played basketball until it was too dark, cold, raining, etc."

At Kearsley, Histed established the school's career basketball scoring record (1,347 points) and boasted a .417 career softball batting average. She also led the Hornets to the 1978 Class A state championship as they swept Warren Cousino (15-8, 15-8). Histed earned all-state honors in all three sports as a senior.

"I was so young and enjoyed athletics so much, I did not think about winning the state championship," Histed said. "We just played to win and everything clicked that year. We had great chemistry and the coaches knew how to motivate us. All of our teams did not have a lot of drama. We were all there for the common good."

At Michigan State, Histed served as co-captain of the 1983 team and was named the Spartans' Most Valuable Player and was a second-team All-Big Ten honoree. She also set a MSU single-season that still stands with 56 solo blocks. Histed is still tied for first all-time in career matches plays (141), second in career solo blocks (115) and nine in career total blocks (363).

"I had a few colleges looking at me, but I went to MSU because they only wanted me to play one sport," Histed said. "I needed the other seasons for studying and athletics came much easier concentrating on one sport."

After graduating from MSU, Histed had volleyball and basketball coaching and teaching stints at Lansing Catholic Central, Carman, Carman-Ainsworth and Imlay City before coming to Davison in 1991. Histed was the Cardinals' varsity volleyball coach during the 1990s and led them to their only state quarterfinal appearance in 1995.



Playing in the national tournament has almost become an annual event for the Mott Community College basketball team.

The Bears, who are ranked No.1 in the nation in this year's Division II junior college poll, have won three national championships since 2003 while appearing in the final four seven times.

They're a true national power.

But it wasn't always that way. A little thing called World War II shut down the entire program and when the Bears --- whose school was known back then as Flint Junior College --- finally returned to the court in 1946, it took them just four years for them to put Flint on the junior college map.

The 1949-50 Bears paved the way for the type of success MCC enjoys today by reaching the national tournament for the first time in school history. And that accomplishment has earned them a spot in the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame.

When FJC decided to put a team back on the court after WWII ended, the first thing it needed was a coach.

So school officials dipped into the faculty pool and persuaded chemistry instructor John Bojcun to take

the job. Bojcun appealed to FJC administrators after he turned Flint Technical High into a Class B prep power with an 86-27 record beginning in 1940.

Success came slowly.

FJC was 5-14 during Bojcun's first season of 1946-47 and followed that by posting a combined record of 21-18 the next two seasons. It was after the '48-49 campaign that assistant coach Don Jarrard decided the Bears needed some additional help to keep surging forward.


Taking advantage of relaxed eligibility requirements, Jarrard dove into Flint's talent-rich City Basketball League and lured former Flint Northern star Don Kelly and ex-Flint Central standout Lee Middleton into playing for FJC.

It worked.

In 1949-50, Kelly led the Michigan Junior College Athletic Conference in scoring at 21.9 points per game while Middleton was second at 15.8. That helped the Bears win the MJCAC championship with a 13-1 record in an overall mark of 14-2.

FJC clinched the MJCAA title with a 92-91 double overtime victory over Benton Harbor, erasing a five-point deficit in the final 17 seconds of the first OT to continued on page 83

FRED BRIGGS - SPORTS LEGACY

A manila folder of old news clippings and a two-hour conversation were hardly enough resources or time for Charlie Briggs and Len Jasinski to tell the story of Fred Briggs.

The problem Fred's "brothers" — one biological, Charlie; Len, a lifelong friend — had wasn't choosing which story to tell, rather, it was where to begin.

Highlighting Fred's 64-year officiating career was a walk down memory lane for the two men, both well into their 80s. The conversation's theme was that of longevity and consistency, for which Fred was revered. He officiated from 1947-2006, and saw Flint's elite athletes on the football field, basketball court and baseball and softball diamonds.

And he could tell you which ones were college- or probound by seeing them play at a young age. He followed their careers, keeping track of the youngsters he watched play at historic Flint venues such as Berston Fieldhouse, Atwood Stadium and the Metropolitan.

"He had a tremendous mind for that," said Charlie's of his late brother's memory. "He constantly followed everybody. He would talk about them, and I couldn't believe he could remember what years they played."

And for that illustrious career full of passion and genuine regard for the athletes, Fred will be inducted Dec. 3 into the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame at Genesys. Before his death in 2009, and after his retirement from officiating in 2006, Fred continued to oversee officials in the Big Nine Conference and Metro League.


While Fred called some of the city's biggest games, the level of play wasn't important — making the right call was. Fred's main objective was to officiate fairly, be consistent and let the players play the game.

"He wanted to make the right call in every game," said Charlie. "It's like in the state finals, you want to do the best you can do. But you want to do the best you can do if you're working a junior high game. He took pride in every game, no matter what class it was."

Len remembers Fred as a "fiery, scrappy guard" who led the Flint Central varsity basketball team in the mid-to-late 1930s. Fred went on to coach Len in the city's Class AA League.

Fred spent about a decade in the amateur league, which he entered after his collegiate basketball career at the University of Toledo was cut short by a foot injury. But playing wasn't enough for Fred. He organized the first Michigan Open Basketball Tournament in 1947, but it nearly didn't happen because of a labor disupte at the Metropolitan, where the tournament — which featured excollege and pros — was to be played.

"Fred was confronted with no seats and no baskets," Len said, smiling. But Len had a solution. He coached varsity ball at Flint All Saints, and he and Fred removed the baskets from All Saints' gym, along with seating, in order to preserve the tournament.



"His enthusiasm for sports showed up again," said Len. "Fred was a fighter, he was a determined individual."

Charlie can't go many places without someone bringing up Fred. The brothers paired as officials for a combined 122 years. Fred was an ambassador when it came to officiating, a consummate professional in every way.

"(His appearance) was always perfect," said Charlie. "His hats were clean, pants were clean, shoes were shined — no matter what he worked, basketball or football. When you walk out, you look neat, it kind of impresses people."

Len added that, both Fred's appearance and demeanor, were "impeccable."

Charlie's memories of Fred span far beyond the realm of officiating, although they were quite good at it as a team. Brothers, yes; but they also were best friends. They lived just about three miles apart in Davison, exchanged lawn equipment, even took their wives out to dinner together.

"I couldn't have asked for a better brother," said Charlie. And Len feels the same about his relationship with Fred. The two were members of the Flint Old Timers together, and Len said Fred's energy helped the group be successful.


"He was so proud and dedicated to it," said Len. "His enthusiasm carried over into that and made it a successful program."

Fred will be represented by his brother, Charlie. An honor to know the man, yes. An honor to play side by side with Fred and have a nearly seven-decade friendship with him was Len's to be had.

Representing a man with such vigor for life, service to the Flint sports community — there's not much out there more satisfying than that.

"It's a great honor," said Len. "I couldn't do it for a better person."

ANDRE RISON - ICONIC ATHLETE

At one time there was serious debate over who was a better NFL receiver — Jerry Rice or Andre Rison.

Rice now is widely considered to be the greatest wideout to ever play football, but Rison was that good early in his career.

In his first five seasons, Rison led the league in receptions four times.

The charismatic Flint native was featured in Sports Illustrated, he caught a touchdown pass from Brett Favre in Super Bowl XXXI, was named Pro Bowl MVP in 1994 and left Michigan State University as the school's all-time leader in pass receptions, touchdowns and receiving yardage in 1989.

Rison's list of accomplishments and awards could fill a book, but he said his latest recognition is the most fulfilling.

He will enter the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame.

The official ceremony begins at 5:30 p.m. Dec. 3 in the Genesys Conference and Banquet Center. Doors open at 4:15 p.m.

"I've been All-Big Ten, All-American, All-Pro, All-NFL, but this is better than all of them," Rison said of entering the Hall of Fame. "Because it's where I'm from, it's where I dreamt about playing sports. It's where I watched Eric Turner, Rick Leach, and wanted to be like them. It's where I watched Charles Jones, Carl Banks, and Lonnie Young. I wanted to be like those guys."

Rison is well aware of the history in Flint area sports. It floors him that he's now within that circle of great athletes who have hailed from his hometown.

"Just to have my name affiliated with the past great Flint athletes makes me proud of all the hard work and dedication that I applied as a youth," Rison said. "There's nothing better than Flint-area sports. When I was coming up, you could go across the country and you couldn't find a greater elementary, middle school or high school athletic organization in the country."

Rison graduated from Northwestern High School in 1985.

Not only did he play football, he was a star point guard on the hardwood for the Wildcats.

He helped lead them to a 55-1 record and back-to-back Class A state titles in 1984 and 1985 on one of Michigan's toughest high school teams ever.

Longtime NBA players Glen Rice and Jeff Grayer were Rison's teammates.

After high school, Rison was a star in East Lansing, where he broke numerous records at MSU. He helped the Spartans win the Rose Bowl in 1988.

In 1989, Rison was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts



with the 22nd overall pick in the NFL Draft.

He enjoyed a 12-year NFL career with the Colts, Atlanta Falcons, Cleveland Browns, Jacksonville Jaguars, Green Bay Packers, Kansas City Chiefs, and the Oakland Raiders.

Rison scored 84 touchdowns and averaged 13.7 yards per catch throughout his stint in the NFL.

He also gathered 10,205 total yards from 743 receptions.

"What a fabulous career he had," said Bob Burek, the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame's former president and current board member. "I even had the opportunity as an official to referee several of his basketball games, and obviously football was the prime sport, but he wasn't a bad basketball player, and he certainly wasn't bad in track and field.

"He had a marvelous college career, a marvelous pro career and we're excited to induct him into the Hall of Fame."

Since 2010, Rison has served as the head varsity football coach for his high school alma mater.

Although his teams have only won two games in the past two seasons, Rison is happy to be back in his city, making a difference in the students' lives.

He's changing the culture within the Northwestern football program by pushing academics first.

"I'm going to always be born and raised from the city of Flint," Rison said. "I'm going to always be a Flint Northwestern Wildcat, I'm going to always be a Beecher Bucs fan and I'm going to always be a Michigan State Spartan."

FRED RADEMACHER - LEGEND

It's funny how things work themselves out sometimes.

Fred Rademacher knows that as well as anyone.

Growing up in Lansing, Rademacher was a typical sports-crazed kid. At Lansing Resurrection High School, he played four sports but his favorite was always basketball. So when Rademacher got into coaching as an adult, he naturally thought his future was in basketball.

But in 1964, when he was passed over for the top basketball job at Muskegon Catholic Central where he had been working, Rademacher began looking toward the future in another direction. And that led him to Flint Holy Redeemer, where he was hired to coach football.

Now, almost 50 years later, that path has led him into the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame.

"When I got out of college, I was looking for basketball jobs," said Rademacher, who graduated from Michigan State in 1959. "I was the JV basketball coach at Muskegon Catholic and also the JV football coach.


"They were going to make a move with the varsity basketball job and I wasn't going to get the job. So I took a look at some other opportunities and got the job at Holy Redeemer. Probably the best thing that ever happened to me."

Was it ever.

Rademacher was an immediate success at Holy Redeemer, where the Flyers were a phenomenal 48-6 (.889) during his six-year tenure.

They won 24 straight games at one point and the streak would have been 37 if not been for three one-point losses in three years. Two other losses were by a touchdown as Holy Redeemer won four Parochial League titles.

That earned Rademacher the head coaching job at Powers Catholic when the school opened in 1970 and the success continued as he took players from the area's nine parochial schools and molded them together without



missing a beat.

After losing the first game in school history 9-0 to Saginaw, the Chargers ripped off 14 straight victories. That included a 49-0 rout over Saginaw in a rematch the following year.

"That was a great place to be," Rademacher said. "It was different. They were sort of all the same type of kids (with) their backgrounds at different schools. They all came from schools that were about the same size, the same kinds of programs.

"We had a bunch of kids come out and things just kind of fell into place." It wasn't that easy but the way softspoken Rademacher described the transition in typical, humble fashion is what helped make him so popular with fans and foes alike.

The highlight of Rademacher's stint at Powers — and his entire coaching career, for that matter — came at the start of the 1974 season when the Chargers beat highly touted Flint Southwestern 21-20.

With a crowd of 8,132 watching at Atwood Stadium, the Chargers erased a 14-0 deficit and beat a team that was led by quarterback Rick Leach and receiver Gene Johnson, who would go on to enjoy outstanding four-year careers at the University of Michigan.

"We felt pretty confident," Rademacher said. "We were the

underdogs. We surprised some people by winning that game. Some of the football players we had and some of the football players Southwestern had ... it was guite a game."

Rademacher retired from coaching at Powers in 1978 after nine seasons, two Big Nine Conference championships and a 56-24-1 record. That gave him an overall record of 115-40-3 — he also spent three years at Coldwater St. Charles — and a Flintarea mark of 104-30-1.

When Rademacher quit, he had the second-best winning percentage (.774) in area history behind the legendary Guy Houston of Flint Northern fame.

Rademacher, who also served two stints at Powers' athletic director, retired because the pressure he was putting on himself during the summer months got to be a bit too much.

"It was the right thing to do," said Rademacher who later returned to assist with the freshman team. "As far as looking back and second-guessing, I really didn't. I made up my mind and went and did it."

Rademacher, who in 1982 was the first Flint-area coach inducted into the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame, is still a regular at Fright night football games. But he doesn't see many involving local teams these days.

Instead, he drives across the state to watch Hastings High School, which is coached by son his son Fred Jr., who is in his seventh season as the Saxons sideline boss.

This season, Hastings won five of its first seven games and is in the running to make the state playoffs for the fourth time in the last five seasons.

"I don't get to watch teams around here; we're always over there," said Rademacher, who turns 80 next month. "We talk football. That's the first question people always ask. He has his way of doing things and he does them pretty well.

"He's had a pretty good coaching career. I think they're going to make the playoffs again this year."



1960 FLINT NORTHERN HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM

By the time Northern High's football team took the field for its first game in 1960, the Vikings were confident there wasn't a team in Michigan that could beat them.

They had already squared off against some of the best competition anywhere thanks to a preseason scrimmage against a group of former Northern players, some of whom had won a state title five years earlier and went on to play in college.

"We had an old-timers games with no pads," said defensive lineman Jim Mawdsley, one of the Vikings cocaptains. "It was supposed to be flag (football) but that lasted about two plays. The next thing you knew, it was tackle. Every play almost resulted in a fight. We held our own against them.

"The game broke up when I caught Ellis Duckett at the line. I tackled him and his foot came up and hit me in the head and I had to go to Hurley hospital and get 17 stitches over my left eyebrow."

That backyard brawl set the tone for a magical season that ranks as one of the best in Northern's storied history.

The Vikings outscored their opponents 243-65, never trailed in the fourth quarter of any game and pitched three shutouts en route to a 9-0 record and the school's second Class A state championship in five years.

Now, that achievement is sending the '60 Vikings into the Greater Flint Sports Area Hall of Fame. When inducted Dec. 3, they'll be joining a group of teams that includes Northern's 1956 state champions, some of whom played in that aforementioned scrimmage against the 1960 squad.

"The guys were dedicated that year," said Mawdsley, 69. "We worked out in the summer together. We became very, very close. A tight-knit group, very different than the previous two years. A lot of us have stayed close throughout the years.

"Now, we're pushing 70 years old and when we get together, you can still feel the closeness. That team deserves this."

The Vikings had high hopes after posting a 6-3 record in 1959.

Coach Andy MacDonald had a veteran corps that included two-way ends Herb Cleaves and Willie Dent; tackle Jerry Horcha; running backs Craig Norse, Hue Edwards, Ray Brown and Ed Johnson; linebacker Jim Reid; and guard Leroy McFadden, the other co-captain.


The quarterback was Marv Rettenmund, a scrappy 5-foot-8, 150-pound senior who played his way up the depth chart after being third string on the junior varsity as a sophomore and taking a half-dozen snaps as a junior.

The Vikings won their season opener 21-0 over Mt. Clemens, racking up 323 yards rushing while holding the opposition to 23, and they made people take notice of them in the second week of the season by thumping crosstown rival Southwestern.

A Flint Journal headline proclaimed "Northern Stuns Southwestern 39-12" after the Vikings recovered six

STACEY THOMAS - SUPERB ATHLETE

Stacey Thomas was hardly a nuisance when she tagged along to play sports with her older brother and his friends.

"It wasn't one of those 'Here comes the little sister,'" Thomas recalls. "It was more like, 'Is your sister coming, because I want her to be on my team?' He didn't mind at all, because I could hang at them."

Her brother Scott was three years older, so not only was she competing on the playgrounds and gyms of Flint with guys, but with older guys.

"I knew if I was going to play any sport they played, I'd have to keep up," she said. "That challenged me and made me want to be better in order to play with them."

It was under those circumstances that Thomas developed her skills, skills that would make her one of the top female athletes in Flint-area history. The former basketball and track star will be recognized for her career with her induction into the Greater Flint Sports Hall of Fame on Dec. 3.

Thomas was a two-time All-State basketball player at Flint Southwestern in 1994 and 1995. She went on to play at the University of Michigan, setting a Big Ten Conference record with 372 career steals. She played six seasons in the WNBA, winning a championship with the 2003 Detroit Shock.

She was also a three-time state Class A high jump champion at Southwestern. She competed briefly in track and field at Michigan, improving her high jump from 5 feet, 10 inches in high school to 5-11.


She ran cross country when high school girls' basketball was a fall sport, winning the city championship.

"I was always in a gym, because both of my parents were teachers," she said. "I was always at a school, always at a gym."

Those years of hard work have earned her a place alongside the athletic legends in the Flint area.

"I was blown away when I received the news," she said. "This is a blessing and an honor. It makes me really just go back to the days when I was a player and a student-athlete, all the people who supported me, and all the hard work and dedication I put into the things I was involved in. It just brings back so many memories."

At Southwestern, Thomas finished second in Miss Basketball voting after averaging 25 points,



nine steals and five assists as a senior in 1995.

At Michigan, her 372 career steals are 157 more than any player in school history. Her 1,556 points rank fifth in Michigan history, as she averaged 13.5 points in 115 career games.

The formation of the WNBA gave her an opportunity that women's college basketball players before her time lacked. She played 175 games over six seasons with four different teams.

"Being in college at that point and there being a league, it gave you motivation, it gave you something to look forward to," Thomas said. "There were always overseas opportunities, but to be able to stay here in the United States and be able to play in front of your family, friends and peers was awesome. I am grateful I was able to play for six years."

Thomas was traded to the Shock late in the 2003 season. She played 11 games with a team led by Flint Northern graduate Deanna Nolan that went on to win the WNBA championship.

These days, Thomas remains close to the game as a referee in the NCAA Division II, junior college and high school ranks. Her goal is to officiate NCAA Division I games.

"I love it," said Thomas, who works for JP Morgan Chase as a day job. "It doesn't even seem like work. If they categorize it as an occupation, then sign me up. When I do games, I'm just as excited. I'm just as into it as when I was a player."

JACK GOGGINS - SPECIAL SERVICE AWARD

He was a businessman, entrepreneur, donor and supporter of many. Regardless of how Jack Goggins will be remembered, his legacy in the Flint area will echo for years to come.

Goggins' achievements include co-founding Compak Inc., which later expanded into Webcore Packaging.

But one of Goggins' greatest accomplishments has come more than a year after his death on Thanksgiving Day 2010 --- he's going into the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame Saturday as the recipient of its Special Services Award.

Although outgoing and well-known throughout the community, Goggins was a humble man and wasn't prone to publicizing his philanthropy.

"After my father passed, the family began going through some of his personal belongings and we began to find thank you letters that dated back to the 1970's," said his son, Andy Goggins. "There was a lot that we didn't know."

"He did a lot of things secretly and that's the way he wanted it."

One story that stands out in Andy Goggins mind is when Flint Powers Catholic lost a Big Nine Conference championship to arch-rival Flushing, where the Goggins family resided.

"My father told me I had to stop by the Speakeasy in Flushing and pick up the bill," said Andy Goggins. "What I



didn't know was that my father was having me go pay for the Flushing football banquet and didn't want to get the recognition."

When asked about supporting the Raiders, Jack simply said, "that's our biggest rivalry, but I still love Flushing when they're playing anyone other than Powers."

That was vintage Goggins according to godson Bill Haley, superintendent of Carman-Ainsworth schools who also coached basketball and baseball at Powers.

"Jack was one of the most positive persons I have ever met," Haley said. "He was close to Powers and all the teams in the county. I never heard him say no or anything negative in terms of helping or supporting someone."

Goggins' generosity and giving spirit was acquired from his father, Joe, who always gave his time to his children.

At the age of 35, Jack took on a leadership role to help build a new Catholic high school. At the time, the campaign was unpopular, but Jack was a visionary who knew it was essential to secure the future of Catholic secondary education.

Goggins, along with countless others, raised the money to open Luke M. Powers Catholic High School in 1970.

While Goggins is receiving the GFASHOF's Special Service Award, he was an outstanding great athlete in his own right, earning 14 high school varsity letters in football, basketball, baseball and track.

After graduating from St. Michael's, Goggins went to Wayne State University on a football scholarship, where the highlight of his career might have been throwing a touchdown pass in a game that featured future NFL great, Johnny Unitas.

After college, Goggins returned to the Flint area in 1957 as a teacher and coach at St. Mike's.

Up until his final days, Goggins could be found at nearly every Powers sporting event and right by his side would be his wife and childhood sweetheart, Sally Goggins.

Andy Goggins will accept the Special Service Award on behalf of his dad.


"It's very humbling and a little overwhelming," he said. "There are so many people that could accept this award simply because of all the help my dad has offered to others."

For two seasons, Halo Burger-Foutch Auto Wash was more than just the one of the most successful teams in the long history of amateur baseball in both Flint and Michigan.

Manager Roger Foutch's clubs were also among the best in the United States.

Maybe the very best.

In 2001 Halo-Foutch was the undisputed No. 1 team in the entire country after winning the American Amateur Baseball Congress' Stan Musial World Series. And Halo-Foutch almost became one of six teams to win back-to-back national titles before losing in the semifinals the following year.

For those exploits, the 2001-02 teams are being enshrined into the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame.

No team in Flint history had a better two-year run as Halo-Foutch posted a combined record of 75-7. That's a winning percentage of .915.

"No question ... they were the best team in the state of Michigan back to back," said Foutch, who doubled as one of the team's sponsors. "Look back at the history of the national championships and dating back to the 1920s, only nine Michigan teams won national championships and three have come out of Flint."

None of the nine won back-to-back, which Halo-Foutch nearly did. And surprisingly, the 2002 team that didn't win it all might have been the better of the two clubs.

Foutch said the thing that helped prepare his team for the amazing two-year run was a preseason trip to The Netherlands for an international tournament in 2001. Although Halo-Foutch posted a 1-7 record in the event, the competition included professional national teams from places like Cuba and China.

"That was a great experience," Foutch said. "That set

the tone. We lived together, slept together, ate together. We played some of our best baseball against good competition."

Surprisingly, Halo-Foutch lost its first game after returning to the U.S., dropping the opener of the City Baseball League season. But after that, Foutch's club didn't lose another game until the state tournament, which it didn't even win.

At the national tournament, Halo-Foutch lost 11-2 to Atlanta in the championship round before winning a 5-4 rematch the next night to capture Flint's second national title in the tournament's 66-year history

Matt Pearson, who joined Halo-Foutch for the postseason run, was named the Most Valuable Player of the national tournament after batting .450, driving in six runs and hitting three homers, including a two-run shot in the title game that put his team ahead for good.

He was named to the all-tournament team along with relief pitcher Shayne Mishler and first baseman John Faccio, the club's elder statesmen

"It was like when Rocky wins the fight," said Foutch, whose team lost in the title game three years earlier. "To walk off the field knowing you're the last team standing, I can't describe the feeling. It's a feeling of accomplishment, a feeling of pride ... knowing you're the best in the United States and Puerto Rico.

"I can still picture our left fielder, Ryan Krueger, catching the last out. It's ingrained in my memory. I can still see him catching that ball."

One of the keys to Halo-Foutch's success was a core of veteran players, many of whom had been with the club for close to 10 years.

There were only 10 position players on the roster, three played in every regular-season game and three others missed only one.

The team included eight high school coaches: Foutch (Lake Fenton), Chad Logan (Fenton), Darin Dreasky continued on page 85

Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame Board Creates Two Initiatives with County Athletic Community

In 2011, the GFASHOF Board reached out to the area athletic community with two initiatives:

1. Genesys Athletic Club/GFASHOF Collaboration

In concert with the Genesys Athletic Club, the Hall of Fame Board established a Saturday symposium for high school athletes. The first of what is to be three programs reached 80 students from ten area high schools with a program on proper training and nutrition. Genesys and

In partnership with the Flint Journal, the Greater Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame will be going back in time to take a look at some of the outstanding scholar/athletes from our area.


Each month a former "Flint Area Great" will be in the "Where Are They Now" spotlight.

Lynn E. Chandnois

Feb. 24, 1923 - April 19, 2011



Lynn E. Chandnois was born in Fayette, Michigan where he was living with his mother and stepfather when his mother passed away. Lynn then came to Flint to live with his aunt where he attended grade school and Flint Central High School. At Flint Central he excelled in sports and was All State in both football and basketball. After graduation he enlisted in the U.S. Navy during W.W. II.

After his discharge he enrolled in Michigan State University where he began his 4 year Spartan football college career. He was unanimously elected All-American in 1949.

After college he was drafted into Pro football, 1st round draft choice, 8th overall, and played eight seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers until injuries forced him to retire in 1958. Lynn was elected NFL Player of The Year in 1952, and made it to the Pro Bowl twice.

After his retirement from Pro football Lynn had an insurance business in Pittsburgh. He later moved back to Flint where he was District Manager for Jessop Steel Company.

Lynn had two daughters from his first marriage, Lynda and Suzy, 5 grandchildren and 4 great – grandchildren. He remained in Flint where he resided with his wife Paulette.

Lynn was inducted into the Inaugural Class of the 1980 Greater Flint Sports Hall of Fame, M.S.U. Hall of Fame, Michigan Hall of Fame, The Upper Peninsula Hall of Fame, Grid-Iron Greats Hall of Fame, and belonged to the Flint Sports Old Timers Association.

The Foundation generally was started just for that purpose, eventually growing into adult programs, too. A result of his intense interest in Flint area youth, Manley inspired C.S. Mott to finance a pilot program in sports and recreation. As a result, the Mott Foundation was created and the community school philosophy adopted. force another extra session. The Bears won it when Bill Hackett stole the ball and fed Middleton for the winning bucket with three seconds left in double OT.

They ended the regular season with an 84-49 rout over Jackson JC as Kelly scored 28 points, Middleton bagged 17, Bob Lambert had 11 and Oscar Ingram 10. Because there was no regional that season, the Bears advanced directly to the 16-team national tournament in Hutchinson, Kan.

After funding the trip with \$1,315 raised through events like a benefit dance and sales of baked goods, hot dogs, ice cream and soda, FJC headed west for a first-round matchup with City College of San Francisco.

The 10-man team Bojcun and Jarrard took to Hutchinson also included Glenn Bagnall, Johnny Howe, Bill Hackett, Lloyd Callahan, Al Laski and Bill Snyder.

Unfortunately for the Bears, they didn't last long in Hutchinson.

After scoring just 17 points in the first half, they trailed San Francisco by 14 at intermission and never recovered en route to a 64-52 loss. Scoring depth was the difference.

While San Francisco had eight players score five or more points, FJC had just three tally more than four. Kelly led the way with 18, Middleton scored 18, Ingram had 11 and two of the Bears managed just one point.

That sent FJC into the consolation division, where the Bears next game was closer but the result was the same as they lost 64-60 to a Jacksonville, Fla., team that was 21-2 during the regular season and ended up finishing atop the loser's bracket.

After being tied 33-33 at intermission, Jacksonville took control with an 8-0 run to start the second half before sending FJC home with a final record of 14-4.

The 6-foot-2 Middleton gave the Bears something special to remember, however, as he scored a tournament-record 32 points in the loss. That was also a career-high for Middleton, who was honorable mention on the all-tournament team.

"We didn't play the ball we are capable of," said assistant coach Jarrard, an individual member of the GFASHOF for his golf exploits. "The paper in Hutchinson referred to us after our first loss as the Polar Bears in the first half and the Grizzly Bears in the second. That indicates we were very cold."

Middleton, who would go on to star for the Bears again the following year, was also voted the Most Valuable Player of the MJCAC in addition to being honorary captain of the all-conference team.

fumbles, scored six touchdowns in the first three quarters and had four TD drives of 50-plus yards.

After beating Saginaw 34-6 behind Norse's three TDs and blanking Muskegon Heights 27-0, the Vikings encountered their stiffest test of the season when they visited 3-0-1 Pontiac.

With coach Andy MacDonald using the fewest players in his first seven years as head coach — only 18 not including the punter and one Viking who got in for one play — the Vikings pounded out a 25-21 victory as Edwards ran for a pair of TDs to power the 200th victory in school history.

It didn't get any easier the following week, when the Vikings and Toledo Rogers were tied 6-6 after three quarters at Atwood Stadium before Northern scored on three straight possessions in the fourth quarter, when Brown rushed for 75 yards in the final 12 minutes of a 27-6 triumph.

"We were behind 6-0 at halftime," Mawdsley said. "MacDonald came in and said, 'I'm going to promise you this: The score won't end up 6-0.' The only thing he talked about was running (the) fullback off tackle.

"Ray Brown had a good night."

Six interceptions helped produced a 26-0 victory over Saginaw Arthur Hill the following week, hiking second-ranked Northern's record to 7-0 and setting up what The Journal called "The Game of the Year in Class A" against No. 1 Bay City Central, which was also 7-0.

With 12,787 fans watching at Atwood, Northern clinched a share of the Saginaw Valley Conference title with an 18-14 victory, leaving only arch-rival Flint Central standing between the Vikings and the state title.

In the 33rd annual Thanksgiving Day classic, a crowd of 18,413 jammed Atwood to watch the Vikings post an easy 26-6 victory behind two touchdowns by Norse and one apiece by Johnson and Rettenmund, who called about 95 percent of the offensive plays — just as he had done all season.

The game was over at halftime after Northern scored three second-quarter TDs for a 26-0 lead. And keep in mind Central was no slouch as all three of its losses were against teams ranked in the top five.

Beating Central on Thanksgiving was the ultimate way to end the season, according to Rettenmund,

"It was a perfect day," said Rettenmund, 68. "The weather was great. The sun was out. We got the lead and the game was pretty much in hand. It was a great feeling. Back then, that was a big deal, that Thanksgiving Day football game. That was the game of the year.

"Being 9-0 was fantastic but if you had been 8-1 and lost the Thanksgiving Day game, you felt like you hadn't accomplished anything. That was the epitome of high school football. It was just a great experience."

(Linden), Mishler (Montrose), Greg Jones (Atherton and Clarkston), Jeff Tanner (Linden), Anthony Holyszko (Livonia Stevenson) and Mitch Zbohn (Sanford-Meridian).

Pitching was the key both years, but especially in 2002

The ace of the '02 staff was Scott Kamieniecki, who had settled in the Flint area after his nine-season Major League Baseball career with the Yankees and Orioles ended.

He originally approached Foutch about working out with the team during the 1994 MLB strike and joined the club as its first-base coach. After his big-league career ended, Kamieniecki anchored the '02 pitching staff that included former minor-leaguers Matt Byrd, Brandon Reid, Mike Villano and Dan Rambo.

"He was phenomenal," Foutch said. "He was a better person than a pitcher, just a great person. You wouldn't even know he pitched the big leagues for nine years. Our pitching staff, it was unbelievable.

"If we scored a run or two, we were hard to beat." Were they ever.

Halo-Foutch went 30-0 against CBL, state and district opponents while taking a 40-1 record into the national tournament.

But at the nationals, Foutch's vaunted pitchers ran into an opponent they couldn't tame: Aluminum bats, which were being used for the final year in the tournament. That helped nullify Halo-Foutch's No. 1 weapon and eventually proved to be fatal.

Halo-Foutch was ousted in a bizarre 16-14 semifinal loss to Easton, Mass., which ended up losing to Houston in the championship game.

Easton homered three times and had 11 other hits in a 12-run third inning to build a 13-2 lead. Halo-Foutch battled back-to-back and had a chance to take the lead in the eighth inning, when it put runners on second and third and only one out. But Dreaskey, who had already homered twice, lined into an inning ending double play.

The game against Easton saw the teams combine for 39 hits and eight home runs.


"The 2002 team was incredible," said Foutch, who was inducted into the GFASHOF as an individual in 2008. "You couldn't wait to go to the park. Everybody we played against in Flint was geared up for us. They always saved their best pitcher for us.

"It was a challenge every night in Flint because everybody wanted to beat you. That was a good league. If they played with us early, they stayed in the game. But if we got ahead, it was over."

Throughout the history of prep athletics in Flint, Flint Northern and Flint Central have had the most spirited rivalry. During the '30's, 40's, and 50's this rivalry was at it's peak and all eyes in the city were on these schools. With the opening of Flint Southwestern in 1958 and Northwestern in 1964, they too, played many memorable games at Atwood Stadium. The competition involved Flint area teams and the Saginaw Valley.






